## 20 YEARS ON, 20 YEARS STRONG!

20 Years ago God, through Simon, called Karen and myself to start what was then Peterborough Community Church. On September 7th, 1988 we held our first church meeting in our new home (that we had just moved into on that day!). The walls were damp and the wallpaper was peeling off and one of the girls' bedroom windows was rotten. Armed with a word from God to 'Think Big' we grew to 15 people before having a 'back door revival' down to 6! Several times I handed my resignation into the Lord but he didn't accept it! But he is faithful, and we kept in faith. Helped by a Plumblin 'rent a crowd' we started to gather a small core of faithful people. Then in 1992, I took the step of going full-time and things started taking off. Growth was rapid, key people were added, souls were saved, and we started moving from venue to venue to accommodate the growing numbers that were coming. By 2005 we were in 3 services at the Regional College and desperately needing to build. Having failed to gain planning permission on a 6 acre site, we then went for a much better 12.4 acre site. Through the wonderful provision of the Lord, much prayer and the sacrificial giving of God's people, we purchased the land, gained planning permission and started to build. In September 2006, with much rejoicing, we moved into our wonderful new facility.

Since then we have seen some wonderful growth both in maturity and in numbers. We have clarified our mission as 'Transforming Lives from our Neighbourhoods to the Nations by the Power of God's Love.' We have changed our name from Peterborough Community Church to KingsGate Community Church, thus facilitating the growth of the ministry far beyond the city. We have launched a new 10 year vision:

- to Impact our Community
- to Connect with our Crowd
- to Care for our Congregation
- to Equip our Committed
- to Send our Core – back into our Neighbourhoods and the Nations

We are about to begin Phase 2 of the building project to give more room for children's, youth and social space as well as providing a new resource centre. We are just taking in our first group of full-time interns, and seeing wonderful work amongst all our young people. We are strengthening our small groups in the region, and looking at how to strategically go beyond!

We are grateful and humbled by all that the Lord has done, but very expectant about what is to come. At our celebration day on Sunday 21st September we were delighted to have the opportunity to publicly thank Simon and Julia, and receive their prayer and blessing for the next stage of the journey. To all in the Plumblin family who helped us, especially in our early years, a big THANK YOU!

## I'LL NEVER FORGET THE DAY...

I'll never forget the day I was allowed to go on my first Plumblin youth camp. I was 12 years old and just under age. It was here that I came across these up-for-it young adults planting churches and taking young people seriously. They were called the Plumblin Team. I'll never forget the nights when God was moving powerfully among us. Ian Bond, Chris May and Simon Matthews taught us from the scriptures, encouraging us to being fully signed up for the Kingdom, living 100% sold out for God, living in victory through our teenage years, overcoming the 'blob spirit' and having 'blanket victory' to help us get up in the mornings with God. I'll never forget the teaching on prayer and hearing God. We were encouraged in radical living as Jesus' disciples and told that there was a calling and a destiny on our lives. I'll never forget the teenage pranks and late nights watching shooting stars, which combined perfectly with the late nights spent prophesying and hearing God speak directly to us. These times formed a passion for Jesus and a commitment to dedicate my life to Him wherever it might lead.



I'll never forget how it became clear that Simon wasn't just pigeon-holing us to youth camps and summer experiences when he sent a letter commissioning myself and two of my older mates, Jon Gray and the late Paul Brister, to run a mission weekend on our local housing estate. We were to be responsible for every aspect, from the advertising to the actual meetings. Having never heard of the phrase "seeker-friendly" we rocked up with our advertising campaign that stated in no uncertain terms that Jesus is the key to "healing, prosperity and deliverance" and that in order to experience it you should come the Technical College on a specified evening. We went door to door, despite feeling daunted at the prospect, and prayed for people. I can clearly remember one lady who was too scared to come downstairs and open the door, but needed healing for her knee. She leant out of her upstairs window as we prayed and Jesus healed. There was also the boy with asthma who Jon Gray coaxed into running around the college hall to exercise and act out his healing. Do you know what? We stepped out a little afraid and witnessed something of what it means to put your faith on the line. It certainly helped to know that we were believed in by this crazy Pastor! Simon took some flack, not least for our cringe-worthy advertising, from the other ministers in town who were asking what on earth we were up to. It was only several years later that I realised what a risk Simon had taken with these 16 and 17 year olds.

I'll never forget the day when I told Simon of my dream that I would plant my first church by the age of 25. He simply accepted it as normal! Simon's belief in me has been expressed as very real support and confidence. From being very naïve young adults planting our first church to where we are today, Ania and I have always felt fully supported and encouraged by Simon and Julia. For us, Plumblin has always been an environment where God can take young men and women who have little experience and lead them to grow and plant for the Kingdom. Back in 1993 Simon was honest enough to tell me that planting a church with only 3 people would either be the death of me or the making of me in God, but it would be one of the best adventures I would ever have. How right he was! As we have planted in Cambridge and served so many young adults, I have maintained that same conviction that God takes us seriously even from a young age and has a destiny for our lives in the now and for eternity. This is what I never want to forget.

## FROM ACADEMY TO AMERICA

On August 12, 1992, Julie and Ian Bond, with their young family, arrived in Atlanta, Georgia, feeling like Abraham, who by faith 'obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going.' We had been with Simon and Plumblin from its inception in 1982, and had been members of HCC since 1985. Now we were embarking on a new faith adventure as "missionaries" to America.



Our home for the first six months was Shekinah Ministries in the Smokey Mountains of Tennessee, where we experienced culture-shock – big time! In February 1993 we moved to Altavista, Virginia near the famous Blue Ridge Mountains to pastor New Life Church of Faith. This was a non-denominational church of around 150 members. We served there nearly eight years, during which our church became a centre for the Toronto Blessing, we started a School of Theology with students coming from all over the state, and we led mission teams to many countries.

Since the early days of the Christian Academy, Ian's passion has been for Christian education and ministry training. In November 1992 we met Dr. Ron Cottle, founder of Christian Life School of Theology, in Columbus, Georgia. Ian has been a teacher with CLST since then, but in 2000 an opportunity opened for him to join the staff of CLST as well as attend the graduate school at Beacon University in Columbus. So we moved again! Ian still teaches and travels widely with CLST, but now serves as President of BU and is very involved in the community, serving on the boards of the State Theatre of Georgia and the Columbus Rotary Club. Julie has served on staff at Christ Community Church in Columbus for over seven years, primarily as director of childrens' ministries. David will be 23 in January. He is completing a degree in Accounting at Columbus State University. He also works in the used car business and has his own taxi business. Izzy is 20, studying psychology at CSU, and wants to be a family therapist. She is active with Amnesty International.

## PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT WITH FRENCH BAPTIST CHURCHES

Stephen Hudson and family moved to Versailles, France in 1999, as associates of Plumblin Ministries, with a vision to plant French speaking churches in the area. They became members of a large Baptist church in Paris, with whom Stephen has been leading and planting cell groups to the west of Paris.

In 2006 the pastor suggested that Plumblin consider entering into partnership with the Baptist federation, with a view to releasing Stephen into church planting as a French Baptist missionary! In November the same year Stephen, together with Ruth Brown from Trinity Life Church, Royston met with the Federation's Director of Inland Mission to begin the process of negotiating an agreement.

The partnership agreement was finalised and signed by the Directors of Plumblin Ministries and FEEBF during the summer of 2008. This partnership will enable members of Plumblin churches who feel a call to France in the future, to be sent out in association with the French Baptist federation, to be more readily accepted and to enjoy the benefits of a smoother transition into French life and culture. There is also the possibility of facilitating an exchange of groups of young people for short term missions.

## A BRIDGE FOR OTHERS TO ACHIEVE NEW THINGS

After seven years of serving in parliament it was time for a rethink. Is what we are doing bearing fruit and continuing to be focused? So through the early summer months private prayer times were spent asking Father to speak and direct our paths. My direction usually comes in the form of questions. What I heard was – what has been the primary area of effectiveness in your life's ministry? The answer seemed simple – discipling others as they seek to follow Jesus in life.

We have a number of good relationships with individuals who we encourage and support in their calling. The still small voice then spoke. Carry on serving and laying down your life to help others to greater things – continue to be the bridge they need to reach the next stage.

Since June 2007 we have attended seven weddings, probably more than in the rest of our lives. Three have been our own children, and the rest have been lives that we play a part in serving and supporting in different ways either in politics or the media. While we continue with the routine tasks of administrative and household service for some, there is also the regular meeting to talk and pray as friends with others. And when a special need arises, like when our friend's son tragically died in May, we are ready to respond. It continues to be whatever, whenever, however, our constant motto. A key factor in making this possible has been the foresight shown by Simon Matthews in supporting us in the diverse nature of the ministry. He has been willing to think outside the box and set us free to be who Father intended us to become.

## SUMMER BLAST 2008

The Summer Blast is City Life Church Cambridge's annual project for the community of Kings Hedges. This year 30 students and 20 graduates/parents voluntarily gave a week of their time to host a festival of free events for youth, children, parents and other groups in the community. Our strapline is to put a smile on the face of Kings Hedges but our aim goes much deeper; to give people the opportunity to experience a real and dynamic relationship with God for themselves.

During weekday afternoons a small marquee on the Nuns Way Rec became our hub. The Kidz Blast Zone warmed up each afternoon with summer tunes, crazy games and an action-packed theme. Alongside this we ran sporting activities and tournaments and over the course of the week saw up to 50 children each day, with an additional 40-50 people chilling with us on the rec. The café had a great buzz, giving parents and children alike the opportunity to try their hand at arts and crafts, or simply to sit back with a cuppa and enjoy the sun-shine. We had so many amazing chats with people.

We litter-picked, car washed and worked on two substantial gardening projects that made a significant difference to the young families involved. Two women have since joined cell groups as a result of our interaction with them in their gardens that week.

During the week a mobile 'blessing team' offered free drinks and prayer for passers-by. They also arranged to buy a new washing machine for a family who had been without one for two months.

For the weekend, we headed over to the Town Green by Arbury Community Centre for a 24-hour Blast in the Park special. We hosted a football tournament and talent show, we cooked breakfast for 300, had church in the tent and an afternoon of family fun complete with face painting, hair braiding, bouncy castles, live music and a hugely popular ladies tent.

This was undoubtedly our best year yet, seeing the community served and blessed both practically and spiritually more tangibly than ever before. We are deeply excited about all that God is doing among us at this time and urge you to stand with us over the coming months as we move into more of what God has for us.
